

Pupil Premium Funding - Allocation 2016 – 2017 - Old Oak Primary School – Update –June 2017

Learning mentor	15%	To support the social and emotional needs of children and support teaching in class. This is measured in the behaviour for learning for particular children across the year. The learning mentor has also been covering classes during staff absence. She always follows the instructions and planning left by the classteacher. This ensures that the children receive the best cover teaching possible. Approximate saving £2000 on supply teaching costs.	Nurture groups throughout the year at playtimes. Raising self-esteem through involvement of pupils in nurturing projects. Food Waste project Bubble and Squeak enables children to develop their social and emotional needs in the year through external projects impacting on classroom behaviours. The use of the learning mentor for sickness cover has meant that all children perform during classteacher absence rather than with an external supply teacher. Vulnerable and disadvantaged children perform better when Learning mentor is in the room.
Teachers x 2	40%	To keep class size lower to enable more effective teaching and individual attention. The size of the class has an impact but only if the teaching is very strong, but a smaller class results in more pupil premium children have the appropriate support more often to enable them to make progress.	Pupil premium children achieve better than the non pupil premium in reading, writing and maths in Years 4 and 5; and in writing in writing and maths in Year 6. In year 3 the children underachieve in comparison with the non-pupil premium, with extra resources introduced (an additional teacher x 3 days since April 2017) to support the Year 3 cohort. Progress in this cohort is good but the overall achievement and progress should be measured over 4 years to Year 6.
Counsellor	6%	To support children's mental health and well-being with children who are finding life difficult at the moment. Four children are seen a week over a period of time. The children seen by the counsellor are pupil premium children at the moment.	The counsellor works with 8 children across the year. Though the work is confidential, a report for the school is produced each academic year. Further information is available on request.

This enables the classteachers to plan a wider range of activities for the children, some of which may need adult support to be more effective. The playcentre is a key area of school life and it is very helpful for parents to know their child is in a safe, nurturing and stimulating environment. It is also important that the ratios of staff to children are appropriate to ensure children are safe at all times.	Playcentre caters for pupil premium children who are able to attend or have to attend in emergencies. They benefit from the close working relationships with the staff and the nurturing environment.
