

Reading in KS 2

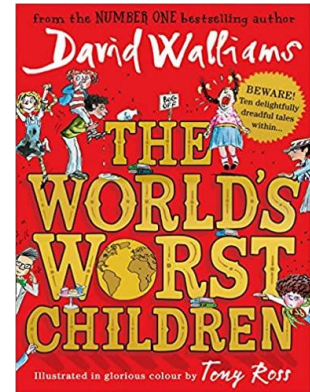

- Choose one of the children and write a character profile.

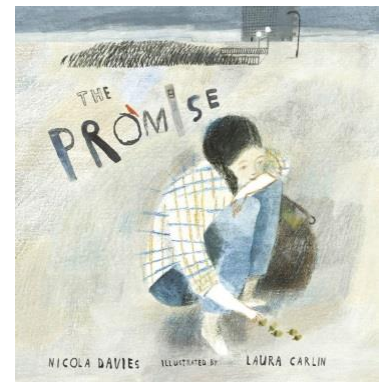


The Promise by Nicola Davis
