SPORTS DAY CERTIFICATES

Today in our sharing assembly we gave the children their sports day certificates to those children who had done well and particular events. There were awards for sprinting, high and long jump, sack race and many more. Well done to every child as they all tried so hard on the day.

PARENTS REPORTING ABSENCE

We have a lot of children off today. The absence follows trends in absence data from across the country.

Firstly, it can be a problem if children miss school on a Friday. It is unclear whether the children are ill or the family have gone away. Families are not allowed to go away in term time, the government expects the school holidays to be used for family holidays.

It is also unusual for all the children to be ill at the same time. Our experience shows that one child comes back from school feeling unwell and over the course of a week, the brothers and sisters may catch the same illness. But not at the same time.

Finally, parents have a duty to call the school to inform us of the reason for the absence. If you do not do this several times, then it becomes a safeguarding issue and could be seen as parental neglect. All our attendance data is scrutinised by the government and we are asked questions about particular families who have attendance below 94% and there are trends in their absence – for example, absence on the same days every week, all the family away at the same time, the same reason for the absence. It is so important that we all work together to get children in school as often as possible.
